PAST PERFECT


FORM: had+Ved/V3

USE: one action happened before the other

TIME EXPRESSIONS:

- Yesterday by ____ o'clock
- Before some time in the past
- When the concert began

She had left when he arrived.

PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS

FORM: had+been+Ving


USE: 1) duration of an activity up to a past point in time

2) result of an activity at a past point in time

TIME EXPRESSIONS:

- Yesterday since
- For some time in the past


They <u>had been swimming</u> in the water for two hours when they were rescued



Concept questions

I opened the window and saw the streets were wet. It <u>had been</u> raining.

- 2. Did it stop raining a short time before this?

Past Perfect and Past Perfect Continuous

The Past Perfect Tense

- + had + V 3 (ed)
- hadn't + V_{3 (ed)}
- ? Had + V_{3 (ed)}

The Past Perfect Continuous Tense

- + had been + V_{ing}
- hadn't been + Vina
- ? Had + been Ving
